From the Editor's Desk

The big news is that the Internet Center, which was adjacent to the Museum, gave up their space, and the Museum has been able to take it over. While most of the space will be used for offices (providing more space to support functions, including a muchneeded workspace for collections), there are two conference rooms as well. The Museum hopes to rent them out part of the time, but they will be available for NEMES. There are a number of plusses for NEMES. The chairs are already set up, so it will no longer be necessary to set up and take down chairs. The larger room has a brand-new ceiling-mounted Power Point projector. The entrance to this space will be through to door formerly used by the Internet Center, so we will not have to go through the Museum. This will be a big plus when there is a function at the Museum.

In addition to this, while I have nothing official, my own observations, plus conversations with workmen leads me to believe that construction of a handicap ramp up to the Jackson Room is underway. This should be done in two months or so, making it easier to load into the Jackson room for the Model Engineering Show in February.

I received an article about doing something that is supposed to be impossible, you can read it on page 4. I want to make this a regular feature. Additional contributions are welcome.

Summary of September Meeting

This meeting was the first one in the new conference room in the former Internet Center space at the Museum.

Mechanical engineer Ian Clark gave a talk on building his own airplane. This is a 12" to one foot scale project, which actually flies, and travels distances measured in miles over the surface of the earth. Ian is the third generation in his family to be associated with the aircraft industry—both his father and grandfather were associated with the aircraft industry in Great Britain.

Ian bought a set of plans from an aircraft designer that were certified. He then proceeded to cut and bend metal in his garage. While most of the aircraft is aluminum, the section forward of the firewall is steel tubing. Ian decided that the easiest way to produce strong welds in tubing was oxy-acetylene, and he showed us pictures of the welding process.

The engine is an inline 6 cylinder design, a deliberate choice on lan's part, as inline 6's are inherently balanced (as anyone who has ever driven one knows). A company in Australia makes an inline 6 for airplane, and this is the engine that powers lan's plane.

Once the plane is complete on the outside, lan told us that it was about halfway done, as a lot of work is required to install the fuel system, avionics, and other items. The completed plane is inspected by the FAA, or a Designated Representative.

Ian described some of his flights in his plane, and brought along a large quantity of the tools used to build the plane. In particular, he brought along the miniature torch he used to weld the tubing..

While we would like to see Ian at more NEMES meetings, he is a Scoutmaster with a troop that meets on Thursday nights, so he has a conflict, with only a few nights available during the year. NEMES would offer an invitation to Ian to bring his troop to a NEMES meeting.

You Can't Do That!!

I am sure that most of my fellow members have run into a situation where they had to make a part or do a repair in an unorthodox manner. I am putting out a challenge – write up your solution to a situation where the experts would say – "You Can't Do That". I will start the thread with a solution passed on to me by my friend Dave Dechambeau. If you have been to the antique engine shows you may have seen Dave and his 1941 military Indian motorcycle.

Dave was faced with a problem. He needed a bearing for his Indian and the exact bearing was no longer available. He could however get a bearing which was slightly wider. The solution – grind the bearing to the proper width. Anybody who knows anything about bearings would say - "You Can't Do That".

Well Dave didn't know that he couldn't do it so he started out by filling the open bearing with candle wax and then had the bearing ground to width. After grinding, he scraped off the grinding dust and excess wax and then immersed the bearing in boiling water to remove the wax. He dried the bearing and thoroughly cleaned it with carburetor cleaner. He re-lubed the bearing and installed it in his Indian, where it is still running after many years.

This was a very clever solution to a problem and one that most of us would say couldn't be done. Please pass on your favorite "can't be done" solution.
